Comparison of Water Rate Structures Of North Canton, Alliance, Consumers Ohio, Canton

City & Stark County MSD

I would like to present a comparison of the water rate structure used by North Canton, Alliance, Consumers Ohio, Canton City and Stark County MSD to illustrate that a great deal of consideration needs to be given to revamping the City of North Canton's water rate structure.

City Of Alliance

The City of Alliance has five price points in its water rate structure. Quantities in gallons are:

Level One:

First 2,250

Level Two:

Next 18,000

Level Three:

Next 18,000

Level Four:

Next 412,500

Level Five:

Next 412,500

Consumers Ohio

Consumers Ohio has three price points in its water rate structure. Quantities in gallons are:

Level One:

First 37,500

Level Two:

Next 75,000

Level Three:

Over 112,500

Canton City

The City of Canton has four price points in its water rate structure. Quantities in gallons are:

Level One:

First 33,750

Level Two:

Next 191,250

Level Three:

Next 4,275,000

Level Four:

Over 4,500,000

Stark County MSD

Stark County Metropolitan Sewer District has three price points in its rate structure. Quantities are in gallons.

Level One: First 10,000 Level Two: Next 65,000 Level Three: Over 112,500

North Canton

North Canton has eight price points in its residential rate structure. Quantities are in gallons.

Level One: First 3,000 Level Two: Next 12.000 Level Three: Next 5,000 Level Four: Next 5,000 Level Five: 5,000 Next Level Six: 5,000 Next Level Seven: 5,000 Next Level Eight: Next 959,999

I do not feel that there is any logical reason for rate adjustments at 5,000-gallon increments. There is some saving grace in the fact that residential rates are increased at each level but not enough to compensate for the low water rates at the bottom level.

As I stated in the earlier memo, I believe the city should arrange to have an Engineering firm such as Burgess & Niple do a complete study of our water costs and devise a whole new rate structure that will put the future of North Canton's water facility on a firm financial footing. (Given that they have done all the engineering on the proposed upgrade to the water plant, it might be possible for them to do an analysis of our water costs and devise a rate structure at a reasonable fee for the city.) By approaching the water rate issue in this manner I think council can implement the changes desperately needed and avoid needless controversy.
